

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Daar ul Rehmat Trust was established in the year 1986 due to the untiring efforts of our visionary and generous trustees. The Trust was envisaged by our founder trustees with the object of imparting education to poor students at moderate expenses and rehabilitation of orphan girls. The main objective of the Trust was to construct & develop orphanage, hostel, schools & colleges for poor girls & boys with first preference to girls. It made a humble beginning with a small number of children at the orphanage, moving on to starting schools and junior colleges. Today the institution runs an orphanage for girls with 175 inmates and manages primary, secondary schools, junior colleges and a degree college catering to the educational requirements of the people in the vicinity. At present nearly 13,000 students are benefiting from the initiatives of the Trust. The Trust has earned a reputation for itself as an institution providing quality education at economic expense.

A.E.Kalsekar Degree College was the first degree college to be set up in the area in the year 2001 with the faculty of Arts and Commerce. The faculty of Science was introduced in 2004-05. The college spread its wings and commenced self finance courses of BBI in 2008-09 and BMS & BSc IT in 2010-11. The college also introduce additional division in commerce faculty to meet the growing demand of the course. The college is permanently affiliated to University of Mumbai.

Curriculum design is an important aspect in every education system. DRT's A.E.Kalsekar Degree College is permanently affiliated to University of Mumbai. The College follows the curriculum framed by University of Mumbai. The current trends in global scenario & the changing needs of learners are taken into consideration during syllabus revision & upgradation. Apart from conventional programmes, emphasis is given on wide ranging subjects related to skill development & employability through introduction of professional courses. The add-on and short term courses help in enriching the existing curriculum.

- ➤ Course Curriculum is discussed during staff and departmental meetings. Principal and staff members give suggestions for effective planning and implementation.
- Lesson plan incorporating the number of lectures and topics allotted to each subject is prepared by individual department and submitted to the Principal.
- ➤ The teaching staff is encouraged to participate and attend workshops, seminars and other academic related programs conducted by the University and affiliated colleges to upgrade the faculties about the latest development in their respective fields.
- ➤ The college provides the necessary infrastructure and support for modern teaching methods like presentation, projects work, discussions,

As per the university guidelines, the college offers a number of core/ Elective options to the students. The college offers various alternatives for the undergraduate students to select optional subjects as part of the programme. The first year BA students can select any one group from four group combinations. Subject specializations are offered for Third Year BA and BSc students. Applied Component options are available for SY BA, SY B.Com, TY B.Com & TY BSc students. The applied components /elective options are offered to students for improving their career prospects & employability. The second year BMS students can select any one elective group as per their interest from the three options available to them which can be carried to third year.

The courses are offered in modular form as per the syllabus framed by the University of Mumbai.

Credit transfer & accumulation facility is available to the students. The College follows the Credit Based Semester Grading System initiated by the University in 2011-2012. According to university under CBSGS every course of academic programme is assigned credit points & has a scheme of learner evaluation. Credit points are accumulated by a learner when he successfully fulfills the evaluation criteria in each semester till the completion of sixth semester of the programme. Accordingly a cumulative grade is awarded to the learner.

CBSGS provides mobility through credit transfer between colleges as well as across courses from first year to second year in UG commerce courses Direct entry to second year BSc-IT degree from Diploma course is permitted by the University Norms.

Add on courses, short term courses, Lectures/ Visits and Workshops are organized by the college for enhancing student's skills & employability.

The college offers the following Self Finance programme /courses:

- a. Bachelor of Commerce (Banking and Insurance)
- b. Bachelor of Management Studies
- c. Bachelor of Science (Information Technology)
- Admissions in the above self-finance courses are given as per the university guidelines from time to time.
- ➤ A minimum of 45% for open category &40% for reserved category are required for the admission in these courses
- ➤ In BMS the admission weightage for students from different streams are Commerce 45%, Arts -25%, Science -25% & Diploma in Engineering & other 5%.
- ➤ The learner should have opted for Mathematics & statistics in HSC to eligible for admission in B.Sc-IT.
- ➤ These courses have a different curriculum and fees structure prescribed by the University of Mumbai.
- ➤ The intake capacity for such courses is 60 students as against 120 in regular courses. This helps in better attention & interaction between teacher students leading to good academic performance & better learning environment.
- The project work is mandatory for all self finance courses.
- ➤ The college organizes seminars, projects, guest lectures, field/ Industrial visits, webinar to give practical knowledge to the students.
- > Teachers qualification and salary is as per the guidelines of the University and Management decision.

However, students unable to pursue regular college are guided to enrol with the institute of Distance and Open learning (IDOL) to pursue further studies by correspondence.

The college persistently works towards integrating the curriculum with the co-curricular activities to bring about the overall development of the students.

- ➤ The Committees and forums like Literary forum, Science forum, Commerce forum, I.T forum and Socio-Economic forum organizes various activities throughout the year.
- ➤ Different departments organize guest lectures, seminars and workshops to facilitate the interaction between experts and students and to upgrade the knowledge of students.
- ➤ The college organizes excursions and industrial visits which provides an insight and exposure of the subject applications to their students.
- The college has various units like NSS, Nature Club, Adventure Club etc. which organize various programmes and visits to areas where students are encouraged to work for the society, nature etc.
- ➤ Different interactive teaching methodologies are adopted in the classroom through audio-visual lectures, debate, brain-storming sessions, to make the learning process interesting.
- > 'Youth Parliament' creates awareness and boosts the student's confidence.
- > Students are motivated to participate in various inter-collegiate and University level co-curricular and extra -curricular activities.
- Faculty members from various departments are encouraged to attend seminars, workshops, and syllabus evaluation program organized by the University of Mumbai as well as those organized by eminent institutions in the city so as to enable them to be updated with the latest trends in their respective fields.
- ➤ Various activities like debates, poster competition, slogan and essay writing competition, elocutions, poetry and story writing competition, naat competition, best out of waste competition, photography competition and skit competition, biorangoli etc are organized to bring out the creative side of the students.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and

organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

The college follows the University prescribed syllabus. Suggestions are given to the BOS members so as to enrich the syllabus in keeping up with the needs of the society.

The college conducts remedial lectures to help the weak students to conceptualize the syllabus as well as to improve their social skills which in turn are developed through industrial visits, excursions, etc. Faculties are invited from Industries to acquaint the students to the demands of the job market. In addition the forums in the college are persistently working towards creating interest in research and encouraging innovations in the subjects taught at different levels in the college, so as to make it more practical and interesting.

The topic related to gender issues, climate change, environmental education, Human nights; ICT etc are already incorporated in the syllabus framed by the University of Mumbai. However to make it more practical the college organizes number of activities throughout the year.

- ➤ **WDC** is active in raising women issues and sensitizing students about respecting women and their rights.
- NSS creates awareness about health, environment & social issues. It undertakes activities that help in fulfilling social responsibilities & creating responsible citizenship. Pulse polio drive, Blood donation camp, Health cleanliness drive, Tree plantation, self defense, surveys, Road & cyber safety awareness are a few noteworthy activities undertaken by the unit.
- ➤ **DLLE** takes up projects on career, status of women survey and population education which helps in broadening the understanding of the issues and finding solutions to it.
- ➤ Nature Club creates interest and awareness about protection of environment and its preservation for future needs. It organizes events like photography competition, exhibition, tree plantation, best out of waste and conducts nature workshops.

- ➤ The NSS unit of the college actively participates in organizing Blood donation camps, Free Thallassemia checkup, Pulse polio drives & awareness programmes, Tree plantation drives, NSS camps, Cyber safety, Consumer awareness, Voter ID camp & other issues.
- ➤ Seminars & guest lectures are conducted on soft skills, personality development, Value education and interview skills.
- Special classes are held for students aspiring for UPSC /MPSC exams.
- ➤ Women Development Cell arranges lectures on socially relevant topics like female feticide, dowry, domestic violence, sexual harassment, legal awareness.
- ➤ The college actively celebrates Independence day, Republic day, Constitution day and Human Rights Day and other Nationally and Internationally important days and occasions.
- ➤ Various department of the college too organize guest lectures, workshops, exhibitions, book reading sessions, visits, film and documentaries screening etc. which are academically relevant.
- ➤ Short term courses & workshops are arranged for developing skills and improving employability.

Informal feedback on curriculum is obtained from students through discussion in the classroom. Parents give their feedback at parent-teacher meetings. Alumni also share their experiences, views and suggestions during Alumni meetings.

The principal reviews the feedback obtained through various channels and initiates improvements on the basis of the feedback received from the stakeholders. The college has introduced certificate courses, academic mentoring and remedial teaching programmes to help the students in successfully internalizing the Curriculum which in future will help them in fulfilling the demands of employment and society.

The college has a mechanism to obtain feedback from students and the stake holders on curriculum enrichment.

- ➤ Discussion of curriculum takes place during departmental & staff meetings. Parents give oral feedback in PTA meetings which are conducted every term.
- > Suggestion box is provided for students to give their feedback. It is communicated to the university by the faculty members during the syllabus revision workshops and seminars.
- ➤ Guest lectures, visits & number of co-curricular activities are arranged for curriculum enrichment based on suggestion from students & stake holders.

The College has applied for additional division in BMS & B.Sc-IT to cater to the increasing demand for the courses. Further the college has also applied for new subjects of Mathematics & Physics.

CRITERION II TEACHING - LEARNING AND EVALUATION:

DRT's A.E.Kalsekar Degree College, established in 2001, is one of the finest institution of learning. It is the first degree college within the vicinity catering to the needs of diverse group of learners. The college has multi faculty programmes in conventional & self finance courses providing vast career options to the learners. The college caters to various groups of learner which includes first generation learners, vernacular medium, diverse socio-economic background & differently abled learners. The institution fosters an inclusive academic ambience. Traditional methods are supplemented by ICT methods for effective teaching learning process.

b. Initiatives taken for the improvement of the process:

- Timely updating of admission notices.
- > Seeking University permission for additional seats for popular courses.
- Pre Admission Counseling for selection of courses and optional subjects.
- Guidance is provided for securing scholarships/free ships for needy students. Also students are guided to obtain necessary documentation as per their case like eligibility or gap student.
- ➤ The process has helped in smooth functioning during peak time of admission process.







Graph: Year wise demand ratio for programmes offered by the institution Graph No.: 2.6.1 a: Graph for B.A




Graph No.: 2.6.1 b Graph for B.COM


Graph No.: 2.6.1 c Graph of B.SC



2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

- Ramp with railing is available at the entrance of the college building.

- ➤ Parents and guardians are given permission to accompany the student to the classroom, library etc.
- > Scholarship and Book Bank facilities are provided.
- Mentoring / Counseling is done for the students.

The College adheres to government policies as follows.

- ➤ Differently abled students are given extra time in examinations.
- Writer is provided on request.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

- Yes, the institution assesses the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme.
- > During initial interaction, the admission committee tries to understand the aptitude of the learner for the course & programme. It guides and counsel students for selecting appropriate course and career options.
- At the commencement of the term, an Orientation lecture is arranged for First year students of all faculties and their parents. The Principal, Vice Principal & Faculty Incharge address the parents & students and interact with them to know their needs and expectations.
- ➤ In class the teachers assist the students in selection of optional subjects. Classroom interactions help the teachers to know their skills and modify the teaching methods if required.
- ➤ Need based Bridge courses are conducted at the beginning of the term.
- ➤ Bilingual Teaching during lectures is beneficial for vernacular medium students.
- ➤ Remedial lectures are planned for weak learners & special cases.
- Additional reference work and projects are given to advance learners.
- ➤ Mentoring and Counseling, further helps in assessing students need.
- ➤ Practical's , Projects, Excursion & Curricular events helps in making teaching learning more meaningful
- ➤ Various events are organized by Departments, Committees & Forum through which student upgrade their knowledge and skills.

2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Addon/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

The following strategies are adopted by the college to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students

- ➤ At the beginning of the term some lectures are devoted to introduce the basic concepts related to subjects.
- > Remedial classes are conducted by the faculties for poor performers.
- Field visits/Industrial visits are organized for the students for practical exposure.
- Encouraging students to visit library after the lectures.
- ➤ Bilingual teaching to help the vernacular medium students understand the basic concept.
- ➤ Guest lectures and events are organized to widen their subject content & knowledge.
- ➤ Lectures & workshop are conducted on Communication skill & Personality development.
- Tutorials for BC & Mathematics are conducted for personal attention.

➤ Add on/Enrichment courses are conducted to enhance their skills and employability.

2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

- ➤ The orientation programme for First year students and parents, at the beginning of the year, creates awareness among them about the general rules, support services, various committees, forums & the activities to be conducted during the academic year.
- Women Development Cell (WDC) creates gender awareness among the staff and students by organizing competitions like elocution skit, poster presentation highlighting women issues. WDC in collaboration with NGO "Majlis" organizes skit, Poster competition & Guest lecture for sensitizing gender issue.
- > Departments/Committees/forums organize lectures on social and financial inclusion.
- ➤ DLLE sensitizes the staff and students towards socio cultural and environmental issues. Every year street play on "Status of Women "is presented by DLLE students in "UDAAN" fest .Various competitions like posters competition, debate, essay writing, skit etc are organized to sensitize staff and students about the environmental issues.
- NSS activities such as tree plantation, save electricity, cleanliness drive, awareness rally, composting, address the environmental issues. Blood donation, Thallasemia camp, health awareness drives, consumers awareness, PAN card camp, Voter awareness drive, are regularly organized which sensitizes staff and students on a number of issues.
- ➤ Civil defence unit gives training for disaster management and first aid.
- ➤ Nature & Adventure clubs organize trekking, photo exhibition, best out of waste, gardening workshops & other activities.
- As per the directives of Government Of India, Swacch Bharat Abhiyaan, Samvidhan Diwas, Vachan Diwas, Yoga day etc are observed by Student Council in the college.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

- ➤ The generous Trustees motivate the advance learner by awarding cash prize, mementos & certificate of appreciation to academic toppers.
- ➤ The teachers identify the advance learners by means of regular interaction in class room and previous results.
- Mentoring sessions further helps in identifying the needs of advance learners.
- > Teachers provide guidance and motivation to these students regarding

- reference work, project work, and curriculum and career choices.
- ➤ Meritorious students are allowed to borrow additional reference books from library for better academic performance.
- ➤ Various competitions like elocution, debates, seminars, quiz, and exhibition, fair are organized in the college. Industrial visits, excursion and heritage walk gives students opportunities to expand their horizons.
- ➤ Guidance lectures are organized for advance learner aspiring to pursue competitive exams.
- > Students are motivated to present research papers in conferences & seminar to imbibe research culture.
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

The records of students at the risk of dropout are collected by attendance record, class test, performance at exams, fees defaulters.

The following measures are adopted to prevent dropouts:

- > Such students are allowed part payment/ installments in fees
- ➤ Office staff assists them in availing government & other Trust free ship/scholarship.
- ➤ Principal, Vice Principal & staff provide counseling to the students & parents to prevent dropouts.
- ➤ Subject Teachers donate textbooks to such students.
- > Class teachers identify and counsel them at regular intervals.
- > Special lectures / Practical's are conducted for such students.
- Additional tests are taken for students who remain absent with medical reason.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

Teaching Learning:

At the commencement of the academic year, the institution prepares the academic schedule/calendar, containing the relevant information regarding the teaching-learning program, holidays, dates of internal / external exams, co-curricular/ extracurricular events & other

information.

- A staff meeting is conducted at the beginning of the academic year. The academic schedule/ plan is discussed during the meeting. Various ideas & suggestions from teachers further helps in finalizing the academic schedule for the year. Committee/ forum membership is discussed & finalized during the meeting.
- ➤ Departmental meetings are held where workload, syllabus, time table, lesson plans & departmental activities are taken up discussion.
- ➤ Teachers from every faculty are member of time table committee. They discuss the workload with other teachers of the faculty before finalization of time table.
- ➤ Time table committee prepares semester wise time table and submit it to the Principal for approval.
- ➤ Teachers submit lesson plan to department /faculty Incharge, who hands it over to IQAC. Academic records & diaries are maintained by the teachers.
- ➤ The committees & departments organize co-curricular activities during the academic year. Students are informed about these activities through notices & announcements in the class.
- ➤ The IQAC reviews the teaching learning evaluation scheduled during its meeting. The Principal & Vice Principal monitor the activities throughout the year.
- ➤ Midterm /Term End meeting are conducted to assess the accomplishment & discuss future plan.
- ➤ Time table for internal/ external exam is displayed on notice board well in advance. The final evaluation of the students is done according to the university schedule.
- ➤ At the end of the term, theory and practical exams are conducted. Moderation is done for college external examination and results are displayed on time.

Evaluation:

- ➤ The college prospectus gives details about academic term & revised schemes of examination.
- ➤ The college organizes orientation lecture for first year students and their parents. During these programmes, the exam pattern and evaluation process are explained in detail.
- > Syllabus & question paper pattern provided by university is communicated to the students by subject teachers at the beginning of the term.
- ➤ Internal, External & Practical exams are conducted as per the guidelines of University of Mumbai.
- Exam time tables are displayed on notice boards well in advance.
- > Students are made aware of unfair means ordinance, revaluation photocopy & ATKT rules.
- Assessed examination papers are moderated as per university

norms.

- > Results are declared within stipulated time.
- ➤ The results are reviewed for improving teaching learning process.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

- ➤ The IQAC chalks out its objectives and plans its activities at the beginning of the academic year.
- ➤ It provides guidelines to all departments regarding the activities of the institution.
- ➤ IQAC encourages the use of ICT in the classroom to enhance teaching.
- ➤ The IQAC gives suggestions to the librarian for arranging learning resources such as journals, periodicals, E- resources.
- ➤ IQAC also give suggestions for the improvement in infrastructural facilities.
- ➤ Members of IQAC also represent important committees including LMC & Admission Committee.
- ➤ It organizes workshops on faculty development to enhance teaching learning process.
- ➤ It encourages faculty members to attend Orientation / Refresher courses organized by academic staff college.
- ➤ It motivates the faculty to participate and publish papers at various National and International seminars/conferences
- ➤ Designing & implementation of feedback system to assess & improve teaching learning process.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students.

- > Student friendly campus helps in interactive learning.
- The teachers brief the students about the prescribed syllabus and they give them wider perspective about the subject through regular lectures.
- ➤ Departments & Forums regularly conduct Seminar, Webinars, elocution, group discussion & debates which helps in interactive learning. Display of charts, posters & models further enhance their presentation skills.
- ➤ Guest lectures are organized by the departments. Students get opportunity to interact with the resource persons.
- Interdepartmental activities like Marketing fest, IT fest, Youth

- Parliament are organized. Students from all faculties participate in these activities which further helps in collaborative learning.
- ➤ Industrial visits help in developing industrial linkages and co-relating theory with practical. Educational trips and field visits are organized for gaining information and better understanding of subject knowledge.
- ➤ Individual/ group projects are assigned to students to promote independent learning. Also students are encouraged to participate in PPT competitions, Research paper presentation, Book reviews & exhibitions to become self directed learners.

The following support structure & system is available for the teachers.

- ➤ Infrastructural facilities such as well equipped seminar/ conference room & classrooms.
- ➤ Adequate ICT facility for interactive learning.
- > Internet facilities in library, computer labs, cyber zone.
- > Updated library resources for additional reference.
- > Reprography facility to staff & students for collaborative learning.
- > Staff members are encouraged to attend faculty development programme to upgrade their subject knowledge.
- ➤ Upgradation of infrastructural facilities for interactive learning. Teachers are provided training to improve their ICT skills for presentations.
- ➤ Regular meetings & discussion of student members of forums & committees with faculty.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

The learning environment in the institution is conducive for critical thinking, creativity and scientific temperament.

- > During regular lectures, teachers frequently motivate the students to ask questions and raise doubts which help them in critical thinking.
- The students further present their ideas & opinions through group discussions, elocution, debates & class presentations.
- Students are motivated to organized & participate in various events like cultural fest, Marketing fest, IT fest, Youth Parliament, Science exhibition through which they exhibit their creative talents & managerial skills.
- They are also encouraged to take part in co-curricular & extra curricular activities at collegiate and intercollegiate competitions in cultural, sports & departmental events which enhances their personality & communication skills.

- Through NSS and DLLE units, students develop sense of social justice & responsible citizenship along with leadership qualities.
- > Students display models & project during exhibition organized by different departments, which inculcates scientific temperament.
- > Students participate in workshops, conferences, seminar & research convention thereby developing critical thinking & research culture among them.
- Also students are motivated to attend and present research papers in conferences and seminars which help in developing the research culture
- The institution provides ample opportunities to the students for enhancing their creativity & scientific temperament. The college provides financial & infrastructural assistance to the students whenever needed. The faculty provides guidance for organizing & participating in the events. They are awarded certificates for their achievements.
- 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.
 - Modern teaching aids are used in the class rooms such as smart boards, computers & LCD projectors to enrich traditional teaching methods.

 - Webinars & presentations are organized as a part of e-education.
 - > Social networking sites are used by faculty for interactions with students and stakeholders.
 - All these aids are justifiably used to give more information in limited time and to make presentations impressive.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

The varied ways in which students and faculties are exposed to advance level of knowledge & skill are:

> Seminars and workshops organized by departments help in participative

learning.

- ➤ Guest lecturers further helps to updating and gaining in-depth knowledge of the concerned subject.
- ➤ Educational / Industrial Visits to RBI, NISM, Vidhan Bhavan, NSDL, gives exposure to students to the practical world.
- ➤ Heritage walk, Nature trial, fields trips, Adventure activities are examples of blended learning where students correlate their subjects to surrounding.
- > Students are encouraged to participate in Intercollegiate & inter department competitions like Quiz, Poster, Elocution, Youth Parliament which enables them to hone their skills.
- > Students are motivated to read reference books in library for getting additional knowledge.

- Add-on courses/certificate courses offered by the colleges helps in career advancement and employability.
- ➤ Faculties are sent for Orientation/Refresher/Short Term Courses which helps in upgradation of knowledge.
- Faculty development training in ICT & teaching learning techniques/skills.
- Faculty members are encouraged to take up research work, by setting aside budget for research spending.
- Library & cyber zone provide relevant resources in reference work
- ➤ Duty leave is sanctioned to the staff for attending/presenting research papers in national/international conferences/seminars.

- Apart from mentoring cell, the college has Career Development and Placement Cell. This cell organizes lectures for guiding and helping students in choosing the right career.
- ➤ College DLLE unit has undertaken career project. Informative charts are displayed related to various careers options.
- ➤ Workshops and lectures are organized on topics of personality development, soft skill development ,resume writing & interviews, preparing for competitive exams, opportunities in higher education, career options etc.
- Apart from the government scholarship the college provides scholarships to academic toppers, handicap students, economic weaker students, co curricular, special prize for university toppers.
- ➤ Office staff provides guidance to students in filling up of Government/Private scholarships.
- > They also provide help in filling up of online admission form for first year students.
- ➤ NSS Unit conducts various activities/workshops on stress management, disaster management, health & hygiene, environment conservation, consumer awareness which helps them to cope up with social issues.

The college follows the CBSGS introduced by University of Mumbai since 2011-12.

The evaluation process/methods are communicated to the students through:

- ➤ College prospectus which includes revised scheme of examination & evaluation process.
- An orientation program for first year students is arranged at the beginning of the academic year in which Principal, Vice-Principal, Exam In charge, briefly explain the exam pattern, evaluation system and revaluation process.
- All the teachers at regular interval explains the paper pattern, ATKT rules and emphasize on giving weightage to practical, internal & external marks in each course.
- > Copies of time table are displayed on college notice boards.
- ➤ The evaluation system is also discussed in the Parents Teachers meeting.

The evaluation process is communicated to the teachers through:

- > Circulars regarding exams sent by University of Mumbai.
- ➤ Teachers are deputed to attend workshops on syllabus revision and exam pattern in their respective subjects.
- ➤ The Examination committee guides & updates the teachers regarding evaluation rules & process during staff meeting.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

University of Mumbai has introduced Credit based Semester Grading System since 2011-12 and Choice Based Credit Grading System in 2016-17. The college has implemented the new system from that year for first year students progressively in second and third year as well.

Major reforms of the university which the college has adopted:

- ➤ Under CBSGS there is continuous Internal/external Evaluation of the learner. From the year 2011-12 there was 60:40 pattern .In 2014-15, 75:25 pattern was introduced.
- ➤ There is computerization of exam work. Online Question papers for Third year students are sent to the colleges .OMR sheets are introduced at Third Year Examinations.

- ➤ Semester wise SGPA and subject Internal Marks are submitted along with PNR at university Portal.
- ➤ University Vigilance Squad team visits the college and take round of the blocks during TY exams.
- ➤ The college staff are given duty leaves for university duties related to evaluation (CAP), Paper Setting, Joint Chief Conductor & Vigilance Squad.

Evaluation Reforms initiated by the college:

- ➤ The college conducts examination for First Year &Second Year under CBSGS
- ➤ The college Exam committee ensures smooth conduct of exams by proper display of Timetable of various exams, makes arrangement of supervisors, seating arrangements ,CAP for First Year/Second Year, Recounting, etc.
- Records are maintained for smooth and transparent evaluation process.
- New Xerox machines ,High Speed Internet, Duplicator, Scanner ,Printers are installed for smooth and uninterrupted downloading of the Question papers.
- The college appoints teachers as Vigilance squad during College exams.
- ➤ Recounting of answersheet is done in each semester to avoid mistakes in marks entry.
- ➤ The college as Centralised Assessment process (CAP) for First & Second Year exams.
- The college is a lead college for CAP at Third Year examination.
- > The exam committee has made provision of computerization of results.
- ➤ Computerized Marksheet of First Year/Second Year carries student's photograph, college seal and Hologram.
- ➤ Degree Distribution Ceremony for passed out students at Third year is organized at the institutional level.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The institution follows the University guidelines regarding conduct of Examinations.

- ➤ Declaration of results within 45 days after exams.
- ➤ Verification and revaluation procedure as per university of Mumbai guidelines.
- Computerized mark sheet with student photograph, college seal hologram is distributed to the students.
- Additional /ATKT exams are conducted as per university norms.
- ➤ College teachers are deputed for University duty as paper setters, examiners, moderators, vigilance squad team & joint chief conductor.
- > The institution has grievance redressal mechanism to ensure transparency in examination process.


- ➤ The vision, mission and objectives of the college, mentioned in the prospectus and displayed at prominent places in the campus.

- Mentoring/Counseling is provided to the students regarding improvement of their performance and grades.
- ➤ Remedial classes are also conducted for the academically weak students.



The institution provides various awards and scholarship which

acknowledge achievement of learning outcomes and further motivates students to achieve higher benchmarks in different fields.

Various strategies are adopted like

A. Teaching strategy –

- ➤ Information and knowledge is shared through traditional lecture method supported by use of ICT for effective teaching.
- ➤ Industrial visit and educational trips are organized which aims to take teaching beyond the classroom .
- > Guest lectures are arranged for the students to
- > Tutorial, seminars, elocution, debates& class presentations are conducted to have inclusive teaching.
- ➤ Bridge courses, remedial teaching& mentoring of students done as and when required.

B. Learning strategies-

- Student centric learning process.
- > Students are motivated to ask questions, solve problems, critically analyze concepts, issues etc
- Notes and references are delivered on important and current concept.
- ➤ Report writing, journal completion, designing of experiments, working projects writing of different computer programs are encouraged in science / computer practical and laboratories.
- ➤ Innovative methods of learning like Model/posters display, Exhibitions, Fests, Screening of documentaries, Plays, Quiz, Crossword, Business Plans, Youth parliament etc are emphasized
- Library is well stocked with textbooks ,reference books, journals, magazines.
- ➤ Visits are organized to give an exposure to practical world.
- ➤ Class Presentations/Group Discussion/Assignment helps in Interactive learning.
- C. Assessment strategies: The assessment strategies adopted by institution include the formative assessment through internal exams & the summative assessment through the external exam.
 - > The institution maintains transparency in the assessment procedure.
 - Formative assessment includes class test, Group discussions, Seminar, Presentations, etc
 - Summative Assessments includes theory and practical examinations.
 - ➤ Continuous evaluation helps in improvements in the student's performance.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) Of the courses offered?

The institution takes up various initiatives to enhance the social and economic relevance of the courses offered:

- a) Placement: Different departments along with Career Development and Placement Cell organizes seminars and lectures related to placement. Training courses are conducted in the college in collaboration with outside professional agencies/academy for preparing students for various competitive exams. SEEDS Info-Tech gives placement to various IT students. TATA Strive, TCS courses are conducted to improve employment opportunities.
- b) Entrepreneurship: The Cultural Fest ,Marketing Fest, IT Fest, Science Exhibition gives ample opportunities to students to exhibit their Entrepreneur skills. Students are actively involved in the advertising and sale of products during these fests. The institution conducts skill developments programmes under PMKVY to enhance employability.
- c) <u>Innovations</u>: Study Tours, Poster exhibition, IT Fest, Quiz, GK and various competitions are organized .Zoology dept. which is a part of Science Forum, exhibit excellent quality of sea food dishes. The Cultural Committee organizes 'Food Fest' which has innovative dishes .Prizes are given to students for their innovative dishes and ideas. Marketing fest is organized by Commerce /BBI/ BMS department where students are given opportunity to explore their entrepreneur skills through innovative ideas. The students with Best Business plan, Innovative idea, highest Profit are awarded certificates of excellence. Students from all faculties participate in Intra collegiate and Inter Collegiate Youth Parliament Competition, which is an unique practice in our college these days.
- d) Research Aptitude: Students & staff are encouraged by Management & Principal to undertake research work. The institution tries to develop research attitude by organizing conferences / seminars. Staffs & students are motivated to present research paper in these events. Paper Presentation competitions are organized at Intra collegiate and Inter Collegiate levels in which students are encouraged to take active part. Self Financing Students are especially encouraged to take part primary data based projects. Students are encouraged to participate research conventions like Avishkar, UDAAN research convention, to imbibe research culture among them.

Various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities which include soft skills, management skills are organized by NSS, DLLE and WDC which helps to develop the skills for community engagements.

- > The data on student learning outcome is obtained through the semester end examination.
- ➤ Class wise / subject wise result analysis is presented & discussed during the staff meetings.

- ➤ Students feedback on Teaching —Learning process is taken into consideration while planning and overcoming the learning barriers.
- ➤ The data collected is reviewed by IQAC for planning & overcoming the learning barriers.
- > Remedial classes are conducted for improving academic performance of the students.
- ➤ During mentoring session students requirement are gauged & accordingly helped is provided to students with diverse needs.
- Taking into consideration of the needs of the students, remedial classes and mentoring sessions are conducted.
- Expert/Guest Lectures are conducted especially for third year students. During Mentoring, student requirements are analyzed and accordingly help is provided to students with diverse needs.
- ➤ Personal Counseling is also given if need felt. Every year, Class wise result analysis is presented in the staff meeting.
- Feedback by individual subject teacher also helps the students to overcome learning barriers. If required, teachers re-plan their teaching methods and sessions.
- ➤ Need based counseling helps in overcoming the learning barriers
- > Psycho /Socio/ Financial support is provided to avoid dropouts.

- ➤ Day to day lectures and interaction in the class enables the teacher to give regular feedback about the student's performance.
- Attendance records are regularly analyzed which helps in improving student's performance.

After the Internal and Semester End Exams, subject wise results are analyzed by each faculty .The remedial lectures and personal advice help the students in overcoming learning barriers.

- Advanced Learners are given extra guidance in reference work thereby motivating them to achieve success in future examination.

- ➤ The proposal for seed money of Rs 25,000 for research was sanctioned by the college management in the annual budget.

- As a result of recommendations, the teachers and students presented and published number of research papers. Also in house presentation by staff & students is encouraged.
- ➤ Departments had organized exhibitions and Fests such as Science Exhibition and IT Fest where research based projects were put on display.
- ➤ Students participated at Avishkar Research Convention organized by the Department of Student Welfare, University of Mumbai and also at UDAAN Research Convention organized by DLLE.
- ➤ Circulars & invitations regarding seminars / conferences / workshops for the staff and the students are displayed on notice boards.
- ➤ The college has applied for recognition of laboratory for Ph.D in Chemistry to J. J. Tibrewala University, Rajasthan.

- ➤ The College is located at the outskirts of the city close to the mountains surrounded by natural scenic beauty.
- ➤ The college campus is spread out over an area of one acre and the building occupies 8107.sq.mt. Open campus has well designed garden, parking area & play ground.
- The college is housed in a huge aesthetically designed five storied building which has all the amenities required for the smooth conduct of curricular & co-curricular activities.
- ➤ The college has a wide entrance with spacious corridors. There are two staircases and two elevators in the college building.

For Curricular & Co-curricular activities the following facilities are available:

- ➤ 22 classrooms are available for lectures with varied seating capacity. Large classrooms are used for regular courses & small class rooms for self finance & optional subjects.
- ➤ Technology enabled learning spaces available in college with four smart class rooms, three Computer Labs, Electronic Lab and Cyber zone in library. Projector connectivity can be availed in most of the class rooms.
- ➤ Air conditioned Seminar Room with 150 seating capacity, equipped with a computer, LCD projector ,sound system and a plasma TV
- > The available classrooms are utilized for tutorial purpose
- ➤ The college has total eight laboratories. Four labs are for science i.e. Botany, Zoology, Organic& Physical Chemistry.
- ➤ Three IT/Computer Lab with total 60 computers and Electronic Lab with sufficient kits for IT practicals.

- > Spacious and well equipped library which can accommodate around 130 students at a time.
- > Cyber zone with computers and internet access to students and staff.


- Yes, the institution has a formally stated quality policy aligned to the vision and mission of the institute.

The College accounts are maintained on daily basis and it also subjected to internal as well as external audit process. The College has appointed an external auditor as is the statutory audit requirement. Further the college is also subject to audit by Joint Director of Higher Education. The last audit was completed for the financial year 2015-2016. There were no major objections reported by the auditor. Any queries raised by statutory auditors are complied with before finalization of annual audit.

CRITERION VII INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

A clean and healthy environment is one of the pre-requisites in any educational institution. To accomplish this purpose, our institution emphasizes on adopting good practices and bringing environment consciousness to our campus and adjoining areas through various endeavours. Fortunately our college is away from congested city area and located close to the mountains surrounded by natural scenic beauty.

7.1 ENVIRONMENT CONSCIOUSNESS

7. 1.1 Does the college conduct a green Audit of its campus?

- Yes, the college conducts green audit of its campus and other facilities as a part of campus maintenance
- The college has landscaped garden area and botanical garden
- ➤ A number of activities are conducted within the campus for creating environmental consciousness.
- > Subjects like EVS and Green computing are part of academic curriculum.
- ➤ The college Nature club and NSS unit take up several initiatives to ensure and maintain the essence of environmental consciousness and greenery, within the college campus and neighborhood.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

The college is undertaking many steps for making the campus and its surroundings eco-friendly. The following measures have been taken.

> Energy conservation

- The college building is well ventilated with glass windows to allow natural daylight and fresh air. It helps in conservation of electricity.
- Appropriate sign boards are put up regarding conservation of electricity.
- The students and peons are instructed to switch off the electric appliances and instruments after use. All the lights, fans and air conditioners are put-off as soon as the sessions are over. This has become a habitual practice of all students as well as staff.
- New electrical gadgets are selected after considering minimum power consumption.
- Every Saturday is observed as a 'No Lift Day' wherein the staff voluntarily opts not to use the lift.

- Save electricity campaign is a part of NSS activity were volunteers consciously try to reduce consumption units of adopted households.
- Projects on energy conservation are taken up by students in FC, EVS and green computing in FY B.Sc-IT.
- Film screening and poster exhibition are held to create awareness about environment conservation.
- Signage's have been displayed for economical use of water.

Use of renewable energy

- To tab the energy resources, the college is in the process to install solar panels.
- The waste paper generated in the college is given for recycling.
- Segregation of waste is done with an aim of recycling.
- Nature Club organizes several competitions like best out of waste, photography competition for sensitizing and creating awareness among students.
- Charts display focusing on Eco-concerns regarding 4 R's (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, and Refuse) to educate the students and generate action on their part.
- Staff is encouraged to utilize the other side of used papers for rough work in office and departments.

Water Harvesting:

- Students are enlightened about water harvesting through lectures in Nature club.
- Water harvesting initiatives will be incorporated in near future.

> Check dam construction

• Check dams are constructed by NSS volunteers during seven day residential camps in rural area every year.

Efforts for Carbon Neutrality:

Managing solid waste is achieved by the following ways-

- Efforts are made by the college to create landscaped garden in college campus.
- The college is surrounded by hills which provide as natural filters and pollution free environment.
- The college encourages local students and staff through "Walk to college initiative" thus discouraging use of polluting vehicles.
- The wastes are segregated by twin-bin system. Leaf litter from the campus is used for compositing and the compost is used in the college garden.

- Planting trees has been one of the ways to further reduce the presence of gaseous pollutant, Tree plantation drives are conducted regularly by NSS unit in the nearby hills.
- Nature workshops are regular features of the college.
- The college has been declared No-Smoking Zone. Anti tobacco and anti drugs campaign are carried out in college campus.
- The College has taken a lead to educate the students as well as its staff to save paper by minimizing its use. For this purpose, the students as well as staff members are advised to use digital devices to communicate and to transfer of information.

> Plantation

- Environmental awareness programmes are conducted through NSS unit and Nature Club. Workshop on gardening and eco-friendly products are conducted in college campus.
- Tree plantation within and around the campus is a regular feature of the college to maintain the eco-system. We had planted a variety of plants in the college, which have contributed to the beauty and greenery of the campus besides effecting carbon neutrality in the campus.
- Botanical garden is created in the college campus to generate interest among students.
- Garden maintenance is given on contract basis to an external agency.
- The NSS unit participates in Mega Tree Plantation Drives organized by University, NGO and organizes events during Environment Week.

Hazardous waste management:

The following steps have been taken to deal with it.

- The department of sciences is extremely careful regarding the hazardous waste generation and its safe disposal.
- The college avoids excessive use of hazardous chemicals in science laboratories.
- Waste chemicals are carefully disposed by diluting in water.
- Heavy duty Exhaust Fans and Fuming Chamber provided in Chemistry lab.
- Fire extinguishers, smoke detectors and first aid box are provided in science labs.
- Chemistry labs has separate sewage chamber to avoid mixing of hazardous waste with normal sewage
- The college has started an intensive campaign to check the use of polythene and other bio non-degradable materials. The students are advised not to make use of packets and envelops made of these materials. They are also motivated to use paper bags and fabric bags.

- Sufficient numbers of dustbins are kept at each floor of the campus for safe disposal of all the waste material.
- Efforts are underway to reduce the use of plastic bags and bottles on campus. Volunteers of different committees are working towards a plastic free campus.
- Organizing seminars / lectures /film screening on waste management.
- Use of paper cups instead of plastic cups had been initiated in the college canteen.

E-waste management:

In order to reduce e-waste the college has taken the following steps:

- Usage of Pen Drives instead of CD's and DVD's.
- Taking out the Xerox copy instead of printing the paper because it consumes more amount of cartridge.
- Using of LCD monitor instead of CRT.
- Hardware parts used for making dummy models in IT department.
- Non working computers are repaired by professional technician appointed by the management.
- Project on E-waste by IT department.
- UPS batteries are recharged, repaired or exchanged with suppliers. Working parts of damaged Computers are reused.

7.2 INNOVATIONS

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

Every institution carves out its own identity created out of the innovative ideas brought up by the Management, staff, students and stakeholders. The college has a number of innovations which sets it apart and had a positive impact on the functioning of college.

- ➤ The colleges is multidisciplinary institution and has introduced self finance degree courses and add on courses to provide wide scope of opportunities for students.
- > Short term courses/ workshops are arranged for skill development and better career prospects of students.
- > Teachers work diary, lesson plans, academic plan are meticulously maintained.
- ➤ Orientation lectures for students and parents of all first year students are conducted every year.
- ➤ Orientation sessions for staff and students for use of library resources.
- ➤ Remedial and mentoring is undertaken by all departments for improving academic performance and providing moral support to students.

- The college organizes a number of inter faculty events for students like marketing fest, IT fest, Parvaaz cultural fest, Youth Parliament & science exhibition which provides opportunities for students to express their creative talents, boost their confidence, enrich the learning experience and prepares them to face the challenges in future.
- Excursions, industrial visits and project work gives students an exposure to practical field work.
- Reference books and E-resources are available for staff and students through cyber zone.
- ➤ Books exhibition, Vachan Divas and best library user award organized by library for staff and students to encourage reading habits and library visits.
- There are continuous and conscious efforts for maintenance and up gradation of infrastructure facilities for enhancing teaching learning experience which is visible in the college complex.
- ➤ The college organizes multidisciplinary conference every year to encourage research activities. Research papers are published in journals with ISSN number.
- > Staff members are motivated to present and publish papers at state, national and international levels. Increasing number of staff members are participating in paper presentation & research.
- ➤ The students who are economically weak are given scholarships and allowed to pay fees in easy instalments.
- Earn & learn scheme in the college provides practical work experience besides helping in payment of fees. Book bank facility is available to needy students in library.
- ➤ The college has a vibrant NSS unit, DLLE, WDC and Nature Club that takes up various social activities that are beneficial for the progress of students and society.
- Active Ex students alumni of the college makes its presence felt by organizing successful programmes like Collaborative Learning Initiative, Topper's Talk and Orientation of NSS volunteers besides attending important events in the college.
- ➤ PTA meetings are a regular feature were parents who are important stake holders exchange opinions and suggestions freely with class teachers. The institution also has a good rapport with the local community and stakeholders.

7.3 Elaborate on any two best practices:

BEST PRACTICE NO. 1

STUDENT WELFARE SCHEMES:

The Epicentre of every college activity are its students. Any activity organized by the institution is done keeping in mind its benefit and utility to the students. Students come from different backgrounds and have different needs and aspirations. The institution assists them in achieving their goals by trying to provide them with the type of support needed by them, be it financial, academic, moral or emotional.

The college has large number of students coming from socio economically weaker section who are mostly first generation learners. Nearly 70% of student's strength is female. Many students are unable to continue higher studies due to financial constrains. They require financial and moral support to pursue higher education.

A. EARN AND LEARN SCHEME

Goals:-

- > To help financially weak students to pursue their education.
- ➤ To motivate students towards achieving academic success.
- ➤ To inculcate self respect, self dependency and dignity of labour among students.
- To provide skilled and confident human resource to the society.

Context:-

College is located in the suburban area. People of the locality mainly belong to middle class family. It becomes very difficult for them to send their children for higher education. Hence our college initiated the Earn and Learn Scheme which helps students to earn while they learn. The enrolled students for the same have to dedicate some hours after college as working hours through which they can easily pay their fees. These students are able to earn excess amount if they work additional hours.

The task assigned in learn and earn scheme is basically the back office work and library work.

The 'Earn and Learn Scheme' was started in the initial years of the college on informal basis the basic aim was to generate interest among students towards employment and give them exposure to financial empowerment. Under this system, students assisted the office and library staff in maintaining the records. The interested students have to submit the annual income record followed by the undertaking letter from parents to allow their wards to continue with Earn and learn scheme without any hesitation.

The students get first-hand experience and knowledge of the tasks mentioned above. It helps the students in gaining fruitful experiences and also helps the institution in establishing good rapport with them.

- > Students have been prevented from dropping out of higher education due to financial reasons.
- > Students were able to pursue self finance courses were a fee is higher than regular course and has better job prospects.
- Some of the students of this scheme have been college rank holders and achievers.
- ➤ Many of the students have got employment in their chosen field and some are absorbed by the institution.

Problems:-

- ➤ Efforts required to continuously monitor students and work under the scheme.
- ➤ It is difficult to accommodate more number of students due to time constrains.

The 'Earn and Learn' scheme has helped financially backward students to continue their study and also provided them the opportunity for developing confidence and positive attitude towards work.

B. BOOK BANK FACILITY

Goals:

- To provide subject textbooks for financially backward students.
- ➤ To provide helping hands for the needy students trying to achieve higher education.

Context:

Book Bank facility is available in our college since inception of the college. Book Bank facility is provided to Economically Backward Class and deserving students on receipt of their requisite forms. Due notice of book bank is published on all the notice boards at the time of admissions. Study materials (syllabus) are issued semester wise to students for the whole year and taken back after final examination is over.

Practices including in the scheme are as follows:-

- Notices are put up in the library and circulated in the classrooms at the beginning of the academic year.
- ➤ Book bank forms are issued from the library to the students along with instructions.
- > Scrutiny of forms is done by the librarian & recommendation list is prepared.
- After approval by the sanctioning authority, Librarian does processing & places orders for required books.
- Notices are circulated in classes for issuing of books under the scheme.

Problems:

➤ Delay in submission of book bank forms with required documents.

C. SCHOLARSHIP

Goals:

- > To provide financial assistance to meritorious and deserving students of the college.
- > To motivate students for higher studies and achieving good academic results.
- To encourage students to participate in co-curricular & extracurricular activities.

Context:

The College is situated in the locality with lower income group. Majority of the students do not have sufficient financial support to pursue higher studies hence more possibility of students becoming dropouts. Many students even have to support their families through part time jobs.

Various types of scholarships are offered to students according to their eligibility and financial background.

Practices including in the scheme are as follows:-

- ➤ Wide publicity is given to scholarship schemes offered by the government, non government agencies and the college through notices and circulars from time to time.
- ➤ The office staff assists and guides the students to apply for different categories of scholarships /free ships.
- ➤ The college scholarship committee scrutinizes application forms for scholarship and recommends cases.
- Recommendations for Academic, Sports, Cultural, and other categories are forwarded by the respective departments.
- > Students are provided by office with the required documents to apply for scholarships and free ships to other agencies.

A number of activities, courses and events are organized in the college to serve this purpose. There is active involvement of the Management and every staff member to achieve the objective of providing self development opportunities and responsible citizenship, thus contributing towards Nation building.

> SOCIETAL ORIENTED ACTIVITIES

Goals:-

Context:-

Most of the students are local residents and are aware of the problems in the society. Many people living in the adjoining area belong to low income group, poor literacy rate and are unaware about many health and environmental issues. Our students fill in the gap by reaching out to them through various societal oriented activities taken up by the extension units of the institution. The students get exposure to the practical work experience and make positive contribution to the society. They also gain experience which will help them to face the challenges confidently in future life. The management and staff encourage and guide the students during these activities. In this process good institution-community network is established which benefits the society by improving quality of life and creating responsible citizenship.

Practices:

A. Health related activities:

a. Thallesemia detection camp is conducted in the college every year in collaboration with Rotary Club Thane Suburban.

- b. Volunteers have participated in every pulse polio drive in the vicinity since the inception of NSS Unit of the College which has benefited thousands of children.
- c. Blood Donation Drive is conducted every year. In recent years we have collaborated with Triumph Foundation, an NGO that provides free blood to thallesemia patients.
- d. The College organizes Dengue Malaria awareness drives along with Primary Health Centre, Kausa in the schools of the locality every year during monsoon.
- e. Lectures, rally competitions are held on various health related issues. Awareness campaign on AIDS, organ donation, tuberculosis, antidrugs and tobacco are taken up in the campus and community.

B. Consciousness towards Environment

- a. Tree plantation drives are carried out every year by college NSS unit with A.K Rural development on different locations on the hills. Students participate in mega tree plantation drive of University NSS unit and also help in keeping the college campus green.
- b. Swachata abhiyan is conducted in the adopted area and information regarding waste segregation, kitchen garden and medicinal plants is provided.
- c. Composting and medicinal garden is maintained in college campus. Projects on eco-friendly products are displayed by the students.
- d. Summer Workshop is a regular feature conducted by nature and adventure club.
- e. A number of activities are organized like street play, rally, film screening, exhibition and competition where in many students enthusiastically participate. Some activities are conducted in the local area.

C. Civil Defence Training:

- a. The college has a warden post where in Civil Defence Training is conducted.
- b. Basic course, First Aid course and Communication & Control courses have been arranged.
- c. One day Self Defence workshop is also conducted.

D. Consumer Education and Awareness:

- a. Voter ID awareness and registration campaign carried out for the residents of the locality.


